1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the North Dakota 2 university system; to create and enact five new sections to chapter 15-10, chapters 15-62.4 and 3 15-62.5, and a new subsection to a new section to chapter 54-10 as created in section 5 of 4 Senate Bill No. 2004, as approved by the sixty-fourth legislative assembly, of the North Dakota 5 Century Code, relating to a unified workforce, vocational, and technical education program 6 system, the workforce education advisory council, the required use of electronic mail, file server 7 administration, database administration, application server, and hosting services, audits of 8 higher education computer systems, annual reports regarding scholarships, the student 9 financial assistance program, the scholars program, and higher education audits; to amend and 10 reenact subdivision c of subsection 1 of section 15-10-17, sections 15-18.2-02, 15-18.2-03, 11 15-18.2-04, 15-18.2-05, 54-12-08, and 54-44.1-04, subsection 4 of section 54-44.1-06, and 12 section 54-44.1-11 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to university system office 13 personnel, state aid to institutions, attorneys hired by the state board of higher education, 14 budget requests submitted to the office of the budget, preparation of budget data, and the 15 cancellation of unexpended appropriations; to repeal chapter 15-62.2 of the North Dakota 16 Century Code, relating to the student financial assistance program and the scholars program; to 17 provide for the transfer of funds; to authorize the state board of higher education to issue and 18 sell bonds for capital projects; to limit tuition rate increases; to reauthorize projects for North 19 Dakota state university and Minot state university; to provide for budget section reports; to 20 provide for reports to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly; to provide for legislative management 21 reports and studies; to provide an appropriation to the attorney general; to provide contingent 22 appropriations to the state board of higher education; to provide exemptions; to provide 23 legislative intent; and to declare an emergency.

20 SECTION 3. CONTINGENT APPROPRIATION - LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT REPORT.

21 There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise 22 appropriated, the sum of \$50,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the state 23 board of higher education for the unified workforce, vocational, and technical education program 24 system, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. The funding 25 provided in this section is available only if the state board of higher education certifies to the 26 office of management and budget that a unified workforce, vocational, and technical program 27 system has been established. The board shall provide reports to the legislative management on 28 the status of the development of the unified system. 29 SECTION 4. CONTINGENT APPROPRIATION - BUDGET SECTION APPROVAL. Subject

to budget section approval as provided in this section, there is appropriated out of any moneys
in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$1,000,000, or

1 so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the state board of higher education for the 2 purpose of reorganizing the office of the commissioner of higher education, for the biennium 3 beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. The funds provided under this section are 4 available only if the state board of higher education submits to the budget section for approval a 5 plan to reorganize the office of the commissioner of higher education. The plan must detail the 6 proposed organizational structure of the office, priorities of the office, and process changes to 7 increase office and systemwide efficiencies. The budget section may approve the entire 8 appropriation provided under this section, or a portion of the appropriation, for the board of 9 higher education to use for the purposes identified in this section. The funding provided in this 10 section is considered a one-time funding item.

Subject to the provisions of this section, there is appropriated out of any moneys in the 19 general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$46,000,000, 20 or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the state board of higher education for
- the North Dakota state university Dunbar Hall project, for the biennium beginning
 July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

8 Detailed comparative statements of expenditures and requests for appropriations by 4. 9 funds, budget units and classification of expenditures, showing the expenditures for 10 the previous biennium, the first fiscal year of the present biennium, the budget of the 11 current biennium, and the governor's recommendation for appropriations for each 12 budget unit for the next biennium, all distributed according to the prescribed 13 classification of expenditures. Following the lists of actual and proposed expenditures 14 of each budget unit there must be a brief explanation of the functions of the unit and 15 comments on its policies and plans and on any considerable differences among the 16 amounts recommended, with any descriptive, guantitative, comparative, and other 17 data as to work done, unit costs, and like information as may be considered necessary 18 or desirable. For capital outlay expenditures involving construction projects to be 19 completed in two or more fiscal years, there must be shown the total estimated cost of 20 each such project and the amount thereof recommended to be appropriated and 21 expended in each ensuing fiscal year until completion of the project. Capital outlay 22 needs may be projected for at least two years beyond the period covered by the 23 budget. The detailed comparative statements of budget units under the control of the 24 state board of higher education must include the same information presented for other 25 budget units.

SECTION 23. AMENDMENT. Section 54-44.1-11 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

54-44.1-11. (Effective through July 31, 20152017) Office of management and budget to
 cancel unexpended appropriations - When they may continue.

30 Except as otherwise provided by law, the office of management and budget, thirty days after31 the close of each biennial period, shall cancel all unexpended appropriations or balances of

1 appropriations after the expiration of the biennial period during which they became available 2 under the law. Unexpended appropriations for the state historical society are not subject to this 3 section and the state historical society shall report on the amounts and uses of funds carried 4 over from one biennium to the appropriations committees of the next subsequent legislative 5 assembly. Unexpended appropriations for the North Dakota university system are not subject to 6 this section and the North Dakota university system shall report on the amounts and uses of 7 funds carried over from one biennium to the next to subsequent appropriations committees of 8 the legislative assembly. The chairmen of the appropriations committees of the senate and 9 house of representatives of the legislative assembly with the office of the budget may continue 10 appropriations or balances in force for not more than two years after the expiration of the 11 biennial period during which they became available upon recommendation of the director of the 12 budget for: 13 1. New construction projects. 14 2. Major repair or improvement projects. 15 3. Purchases of new equipment costing more than ten thousand dollars per unit if it was 16 ordered during the first twelve months of the biennium in which the funds were 17 appropriated. 18 4. The purchase of land by the state on a "contract for deed" purchase if the total 19 purchase price is within the authorized appropriation. 20 5. Purchases by the department of transportation of roadway maintenance equipment 21 costing more than ten thousand dollars per unit if the equipment was ordered during 22 the first twenty-one months of the biennium in which the funds were appropriated. 23 Authorized ongoing information technology projects. 6. 24 (Effective after July 31, 20152017) Office of management and budget to cancel 25 unexpended appropriations - When they may continue. The office of management and 26 budget, thirty days after the close of each biennial period, shall cancel all unexpended 27 appropriations or balances of appropriations after the expiration of the biennial period during 28 which they became available under the law. Unexpended appropriations for the state historical 29 society are not subject to this section and the state historical society shall report on the amounts 30 and uses of funds carried over from one biennium to the appropriations committees of the next 31 subsequent legislative assembly. The chairmen of the appropriations committees of the senate

1 and house of representatives of the legislative assembly with the office of the budget may 2 continue appropriations or balances in force for not more than two years after the expiration of 3 the biennial period during which they became available upon recommendation of the director of 4 the budget for: 5 1. New construction projects. 6 2. Major repair or improvement projects. 7 3. Purchases of new equipment costing more than ten thousand dollars per unit if it was 8 ordered during the first twelve months of the biennium in which the funds were 9 appropriated. 10 4. The purchase of land by the state on a "contract for deed" purchase if the total 11 purchase price is within the authorized appropriation. 12 5. Purchases by the department of transportation of roadway maintenance equipment 13 costing more than ten thousand dollars per unit if the equipment was ordered during 14 the first twenty-one months of the biennium in which the funds were appropriated. 15 6. Authorized ongoing information technology projects. 16 SECTION 24. REPEAL. Chapter 15-62.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is repealed. 17 SECTION 25. SYSTEMWIDE FUNDING POOLS - TRANSFER AUTHORITY -18 LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT REPORT. The following line items contained in subdivision 1 of 19 section 1 of this Act include funding that may be transferred in full or in part as provided in this 20 section for the period beginning with the effective date of this Act and ending June 30, 2017, by 21 the state board of higher education to the institutions and entities under its control as follows: 22 The deferred maintenance funding pool line item includes funding that must be used 1. 23 for eligible projects to address deferred maintenance at institutions identified in this 24 subsection. To be eligible to receive funding under this subsection, a project must be 25 identified in campus master plan and space utilization studies and be approved by the 26 board. The maximum amount that may be transferred to each institution from the 27 funding pool is as follows: 28 \$3,500,000 to North Dakota state university; a. 29 \$3,500,000 to the university of North Dakota; b. 30 C. \$700,000 to Bismarck state college; 31 \$500,000 to Mayville state university; and d.

1 e. \$500,000 to lake region state college. 2 2. The education incentive programs line item includes funding that may be allocated to 3 education incentive programs based on program eligibility criteria and the reduction or 4 elimination of specific programs as determined by the board. 5 3. The campus security funding pool line item includes funding that must be used to 6 address security needs at institutions based on campus risk and security 7 assessments. 8 4. The internal audit funding pool line item includes funding that must be used for 9 systemwide and campus internal audit purposes. 10 The state board of higher education shall provide reports to the legislative management during 11 the 2015-16 interim regarding distributions from the deferred maintenance, campus security, 12 and internal audit funding pools. 13 SECTION 26. CAMPUS CAPITAL PROJECTS - PROJECT MANAGEMENT. During the 14 biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017, each capital project authorized by 15 the state board of higher education must have adequate project management oversight by 16 either an institution official or a representative of an external entity. An institution may seek 17 assistance from the university system office for project management oversight of a capital 18 project. 19 SECTION 27. NORTH DAKOTA STATE UNIVERSITY - MINARD HALL -20 **REAUTHORIZATION - BUDGET SECTION REPORT.** In addition to the funds appropriated in 21 section 1 of this Act, North Dakota state university may use unspent state funding from the 22 \$5,000,000 appropriation received during the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending 23 June 30, 2009, and unspent state funding from the \$13,000,000 appropriation received during 24 the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, and ending June 30, 2011, and special funds derived from 25 insurance litigation settlement and other local institutional funds, to a total of \$23,474,300 for 26 the Minard hall project, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. 27 North Dakota state university shall report to the budget section regarding the status of the 28 Minard hall project and may request increased spending authorization from the budget section 29 for the project. 30 SECTION 28. MINOT STATE UNIVERSITY - FOOTBALL STADIUM PRESS BOX -31 **REAUTHORIZATION.** Minot state university may use up to \$4,000,000 in private funds from the

city of Minot and \$1,000,000 in local institutional funds for the completion of the football stadium
 press box during the period beginning with the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30,
 2017.

SECTION 29. STUDENT LOAN TRUST FUND. Subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act
includes the sum of \$3,504,744, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the student
loan trust fund, of which \$465,307 is for the professional student exchange program, \$500,000
is for grants to tribally-controlled community colleges, \$2,000,000 is for campus leadership
transition costs at Dickinson state university, and \$539,437 is for connectND campus solution
positions, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

SECTION 30. UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA SCHOOL OF MEDICINE AND HEALTH
SCIENCES OPERATIONS. The operations line item in subdivision 5 of section 1 of this Act
includes a funding allocation from the higher education per student credit-hour funding formula
attributable to inflation during the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. A
minimum of twenty-five percent of the allocation must be transferred by the state board of
higher education to the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences.

16 SECTION 31. FEDERAL, PRIVATE, AND OTHER FUNDS - APPROPRIATION. All funds, 17 in addition to those appropriated in section 1 of this Act, from federal, private, and other sources 18 for competitive grants or other funds that the legislative assembly has not indicated the intent to 19 reject, including tuition revenue, received by the state board of higher education and the 20 institutions and entities under the control of the state board of higher education, are 21 appropriated to the board and those institutions and entities, for the biennium beginning July 1, 22 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. All additional funds received under the North Dakota-23 Minnesota reciprocity agreement during the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 24 30, 2017, are appropriated to the state board of higher education for reimbursement to 25 institutions under the control of the board.

SECTION 32. TRANSFER AUTHORITY. If, during the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017, the state board of higher education determines that funds allocated to operations in section 1 of this Act are needed for capital assets, the board may transfer funds from operations to capital assets. The board shall report any transfer of funds under this section to the office of management and budget.

1 SECTION 33. EXEMPTION - USE OF 2013-15 BIENNIUM APPROPRIATIONS -2 CONTINGENT APPROPRIATION REDUCTION. Of the \$5,000,000 appropriated from the 3 general fund in the performance funding pool line item in section 1 of chapter 34 of the 2013 4 Session Laws, \$1,000,000 is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and must be canceled by the 5 office of management and budget on the effective date of this section. Pursuant to section 6 54-44.1-11, the sum of \$4,000,000 appropriated in the performance funding pool line item of 7 subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 34 of the 2013 Session Laws may be continued into the 8 biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. Of the unexpended appropriation, 9 the state board of higher education shall transfer \$1,500,000 to Williston state college, 10 \$1,500,000 to Dickinson state university, \$500,000 to Minot state university, and \$500,000 to 11 Dakota college at Bottineau for deferred maintenance and extraordinary campus needs. The 12 board shall transfer a prorated amount if sufficient funding is not available to provide for full 13 transfers. Excluding the transfers authorized in this section, the office of management and 14 budget shall reduce the general fund appropriation authority included in the system governance 15 line item contained in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act in an amount equal to any 16 appropriation used from the performance funding pool line item contained in section 1 of 17 chapter 34 of the 2013 Session Laws.

SECTION 34. EXEMPTION. The sum of \$750,000 from the general fund is appropriated in the capital assets line item in subdivision 5 of section 1 of chapter 34 of the 2013 Session Laws for the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences Bismarck family practice center skywalk project. Any remaining unexpended appropriation authority for the project is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and the office of management and budget shall cancel the remaining unexpended appropriation authority on the effective date of this section.

24 SECTION 35. EXEMPTION - THEODORE ROOSEVELT CENTER PROJECT -

APPROPRIATION CANCELLATION. Section 3 of chapter 34 of the 2013 Session Laws includes the sum of \$6,000,000 from the general fund appropriated to Dickinson state university for the Theodore Roosevelt center project. Section 4 of chapter 49 of the 2013 Session Laws includes the sum of \$6,000,000 from the general fund appropriated to Dickinson state university for the Theodore Roosevelt center project. Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-11, the office of management and budget shall cancel these appropriations on July 1, 2016, unless Dickinson state university certifies to the office of management and budget that a site has been selected for the Theodore Roosevelt center, construction plans have been developed for the project, and
 construction on the center will commence prior to January 1, 2017.

3 SECTION 36. FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT POSITION ADJUSTMENTS. Notwithstanding 4 any other provisions of law, the state board of higher education may adjust full-time equivalent 5 positions as needed, subject to the availability of funds, for institutions and entities under its 6 control during the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. The North 7 Dakota university system shall report any adjustments to the office of management and budget 8 before the submission of the 2017-19 biennium budget request. 9 SECTION 37. BOND ISSUANCE AUTHORIZATION - PURPOSES. The state board of 10 higher education, in accordance with chapter 15-55, may arrange for the funding of projects 11 authorized in this section, declared to be in the public interest, through the issuance of 12 self-liquidating, tax-exempt evidences of indebtedness under chapter 15-55, beginning with the 13 effective date of this section and ending June 30, 2017. Evidences of indebtedness issued 14 pursuant to this section are not a general obligation of the state of North Dakota. Any 15 unexpended balance resulting from the proceeds of the evidences of indebtedness must be 16 placed in a sinking fund to be used for the retirement of indebtedness. The evidences of 17 indebtedness may be issued and the proceeds are appropriated in section 1 of this Act for the 18 following capital projects: 19 Dakota college at Bottineau - dormitory renovations \$2,900,000 20 North Dakota state university - aquatic center 10,000,000 21 Total special funds \$12,900,000 22 SECTION 38. USE OF EXTRAORDINARY REPAIRS FUNDING - MATCHING FUNDS -23 LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT REPORT. The capital assets line items in subdivisions 2 24 through 12 of section 1 of this Act include funding for institution extraordinary repairs. An 25 institution shall provide two dollars of matching funds from operations or other sources for each 26 one dollar of extraordinary repairs funding used for a project. An institution may not use a 27 transfer from the deferred maintenance funding pool to provide matching funds under this 28 section. This section does not apply to funding provided for repairs and maintenance of the 29 North Dakota museum of art facility. During the 2015-16 interim, the state board of higher 30 education shall provide a report to the legislative management regarding the use of 31 extraordinary repairs funding and related matching funds.

1 SECTION 39. TUITION RATE INCREASE LIMITATIONS - BUDGET SECTION

- 2 APPROVAL.
- Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the state board of higher education may
 not increase tuition rates for students attending institutions of higher education under
 its control during the 2015-16 academic year by more than two and one-half percent
 as compared to the tuition rate in effect during the 2015 spring semester unless the
 board receives prior budget section approval.
- 8 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the state board of higher education may 9 not increase tuition rates for students attending institutions of higher education under 10 its control during the 2016-17 academic year by more than two and one-half percent 11 as compared to the tuition rate in effect during the 2016 spring semester unless the 12 board receives prior budget section approval.
- 3. For purposes of this section, an institution must calculate a tuition rate increase based
 on the tuition rate paid by an average full-time student. Any adjustments to a tuition
 rate resulting from a change in an institution's method of charging tuition, including the
 addition of fees to tuition rates or charging tuition based on a per-credit rate, must be
 included in tuition rate calculations under this section.
- This section does not apply to tuition rates determined under tuition reciprocity
 agreements entered into by the state board of higher education with other states or
 state education compacts.
- 5. This section does not apply to tuition rates charged for programs offered through the
 university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences.

23 SECTION 40. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT REPORT - DICKINSON STATE

24 **UNIVERSITY.** Before July 1, 2016, the state board of higher education shall provide a report to

the legislative management regarding the operations of Dickinson state university. The report

- 26 must detail the financial condition of the institution and board directives and plans to improve
- 27 the financial stability of the institution.

SECTION 41. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - ATTORNEY SALARIES. It is the intent of the
 sixty-fourth legislative assembly that all assistant attorneys general employed in the office of the
 attorney general, including attorneys assigned to higher education issues, be provided salary

1	and benefits in accordance with uniform salary and benefits schedules established by the			
2	attorney general.			
3	SECTION 42. STATE BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION DATA INCONSISTENCIES -			
4	REPORT TO THE SIXTY-FIFTH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY. During the biennium beginning			
5	July 1, 2	2015, and ending June 30, 2017, the state board of higher education shall evaluate the

29	report to the appropriations committees of the sixty-fifth legislative assembly regarding the use			
30	of funds	received by institutions under its control from permanent fund income established for

1 SECTION 44. EXTRAORDINARY CAMPUS NEEDS FUNDING - REPORT TO THE 2 SIXTY-FIFTH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY. The operations line item in subdivision 4 of section 1 3 of this Act includes the sum of \$2,500,000 for extraordinary campus needs at Williston state 4 college. Williston state college shall provide a report to the appropriations committees of the 5 sixty-fifth legislative assembly regarding the use of this funding and the need to continue the 6 funding in to the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019. 7 SECTION 45. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - HIGHER EDUCATION COURSE 8 **DELIVERY METHODS.** During the 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall consider 9 studying the delivery methods of higher education courses offered by institutions under the 10 control of the state board of higher education. The study, if conducted, must include a review of 11 current methods of distance education offered by institutions, options to improve delivery 12

methods, revenue generated by each type of delivery method, and how course delivery
methods may affect future campus infrastructure needs. The legislative management shall
report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the
recommendations, to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly.

16 SECTION 46. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - INSTITUTION MISSIONS. During 17 the 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the missions of all two-18 year institutions and the missions of any other institutions under the control of the state board of 19 higher education, as determined by the legislative management, including the feasibility and 20 desirability of the institutions offering only workforce and career and technical education 21 programs. The study must review the current missions of the institutions, current and projected 22 course and program enrollments, projected workforce needs, including how the institutions can 23 serve the needs, and options to increase operating efficiencies. The legislative management 24 shall report its findings, together with any legislation necessary to implement the findings, to the 25 sixty-fifth legislative assembly.

SECTION 47. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - INSTITUTION ADMINISTRATION COSTS. During the 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying administrative costs at institutions under the control of the state board of higher education. The study, if conducted, must review the number of administrator positions at each institution, the number of new administrator positions added at each institution during the previous five academic years, the total salaries and benefits associated with the administrator positions, the

1 average salaries and benefits for administrator positions at each institution for each of the

- 2 previous five fiscal years, the percentage of overall institution operating costs attributable to
- 3 administration, and options to provide future increased legislative appropriations to institutions
- 4 specifically for instructional purposes. The legislative management shall report its findings,
- 5 together with any legislation necessary to implement the findings, to the sixty-fifth legislative
- 6 assembly.

7 SECTION 48. EMERGENCY. Sections 9, 25, 28, 33, 34, and 37 and the capital assets,

8 campus security pool, and deferred maintenance pool line items in section 1 of this Act are

9 declared to be an emergency measure.
