- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact section 20.1-04-07.1 and chapter 20.1-05.1 of the North
- 2 Dakota Century Code, relating to wild turkey hunting licenses for veterans receiving hunting
- 3 <u>expeditions from a nonprofit organization and authorization for issuance of special allocation</u>
- 4 hunting licenses; to amend and reenact sections 20.1-02-04, 20.1-04-07, 20.1-08-04.1,
- 5 20.1-08-04.2, and 20.1-08-04.6 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to authorization for
- 6 issuance of special allocation hunting licenses; to repeal sections 20.1-08-04.8, 20.1-08-04.12,
- 7 and 20.1-08-04.13 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to authorization for issuance of
- 8 special allocation hunting licenses; and to declare an emergency.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

10 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 20.1-02-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is

- 11 amended and reenacted as follows:
- 12 **20.1-02-04.** Duties of director.
- 13 The director shall:
- 14 1. Maintain an office in Bismarck.
- 15 2. Adopt rules necessary to the conduct of the department.
- 16 3. Keep an accurate record of all the transactions and expenditures of the department
 17 and submit a biennial report to the governor and the secretary of state in accordance
 18 with section 54-06-04.
- 19 4. Enforce state laws involving wildlife.
- S. Collect and distribute statistics and information germane to this title and publish
 information and reports, including a monthly bulletin, for the education of the public in
 conservation matters.
- Examine all waters of the state and, wherever suitable waters are found, arrange to
 plant, stock, or deposit available fish, spawn, or fry.

1	7.	Cooperate with the United States fish and wildlife service, or any other appropriate	
2		federal agency, and make applications for fish, spawn, and fry, to apportion and	
3		deposit in waters of the state.	
4	8.	Cooperate with and assist clubs and individuals in stocking the waters of this state	
5		with fish.	
6	9.	Remove or take from any public waters containing a surplus of fish any reasonable	
7		quantity of fish for stocking other public waters, hatching or propagating purposes, or	
8		exchange with other states and countries.	
9	10.	Control, construct, mark, designate, manage, and have charge of all state fish	
10		hatcheries, state game farms, game refuges, and game reserves owned, leased, or	
11		controlled for the propagation and protection of game birds, game animals, and fish.	
12	11.	Supervise the breeding, propagation, capture, distribution, and preservation of game	
13		birds, game animals, and fish as the director deems advisable.	
14	12.	Adopt rules necessary for carrying out section 20.1-10-01 and these rules have the	
15		force of law after one publication in the daily newspapers of this state.	
16	13.	Provide the necessary blank forms for making applications for licenses of all kinds and	
17		distribute them among those authorized to sell licenses.	
18	14.	Keep a record of all permits issued for the purpose of propagation and domestication	
19		of game birds or protected animals.	
20	15.	Issue four any deer licenses and six any white-tailed deer licenses annually to the	
21		injured military wildlife project of North Dakota for distribution. A license issued under-	
22		this subsection is valid during the period of the deer bow season.	
23	SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 20.1-04-07 of the North Dakota Century Code is		
24	amende	d and reenacted as follows:	
25	20.1	-04-07. Governor's proclamation concerning the taking of wild turkeys - National	
26	wild tur	key federation raffle - Youth spring wild turkey licenses - Outdoor adventure	
27	foundat	ion<mark>Spring wild turkey</mark> licenses.	
28	1.	By proclamation the The governor by proclamation may provide for a permit season to	
29		take wild turkeys in the manner, number, places, and times deemed in the state's best	
30		interests ; however: .	

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a.	By proclamation the governor may make available to the national wild turkey
	federation one license per year to hunt wild turkeys in the spring in the manner,
	places, and times as the governor prescribes. The national wild turkey federation
	shall hold a raffle or may auction to the highest bidder, whether resident or
	nonresident, a license to hunt wild turkeys. If an individual receives a wild turkey
	license through the raffle or the auction, the individual is not eligible to apply for a
	wild turkey license through the game and fish department that year. No more-
	than ten percent of the gross proceeds of the raffle may be used to promote the
	raffle. Ten percent of the net proceeds of the raffle or auction may be retained by
	the local, state, or national wild turkey federation entity conducting the raffle or
	auction. All remaining net proceeds must be deposited in the national wild turkey
	federation superfund and used for wild turkey management and related projects-
	in this state. The national wild turkey federation shall submit reports concerning-
	the raffle or auction as the director requires.
b.	By proclamation the The governor also by proclamation may allow individuals
	who are first-time youth spring wild turkey hunters to receive one spring wild
	turkey license valid for the regular spring wild turkey season. To be eligible to
	receive a spring wild turkey license, an individual must be fifteen years of age or
	younger on the opening day of the spring wild turkey season and have never
	received a spring wild turkey license.
C.	By proclamation the governor may make available to the outdoor adventure-
	foundation up to two licenses to hunt a turkey in the spring season. The
	foundation shall make one license available to each qualified youth to hunt as-
	provided in the governor's proclamation. A qualified youth receiving a license-
	under this section must comply with hunter education requirements and if under-
	the age of eighteen must be accompanied by an adult twenty-one years of age or
	b.

- 27 older. As used in this section, "qualified youth" means an individual who has-
- 28 cancer or a life-threatening illness, is of legal age to hunt a turkey, is under-
- 29 twenty-five years of age, is a resident, and is sponsored by the foundation. The
- 30 foundation must provide the department supporting documentation-

1		demonstrating compliance with this section. The director may adopt rules to
2		implement this section.
3	2.	The governor by proclamation shall make available to residents and nonresidents any
4		permitslicenses remaining after the resident fall drawing.
5	SEC	TION 3. Section 20.1-04-07.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and
6	enacted	as follows:
7	20.1	-04-07.1. Spring wild turkey licenses for certain veterans.
8	The	director shall issue four spring wild turkey licenses and permits to hunt wild turkeys to
9	veterans	residing in North Dakota and who are selected by a nonprofit organization that
10	provides	outdoor recreation activities to veterans to help improve their health and well-being
11	and to re	educe the rate of suicide among veterans. The organization shall provide each veteran
12	a hunting	g expedition during the spring wild turkey season designed to achieve the purpose of
13	the orga	nization during which the veteran may use the veteran's wild turkey license.
14	SEC	TION 4. Chapter 20.1-05.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted
15	as follow	/S:
16	<u>20.1</u>	-05.1-01. Special allocation hunting license authorization.
17	The	director shall authorize issuance of the following annual special allocation hunting
18	licenses	<u>.</u>
19	<u>1.</u>	Four any deer licenses and six any white-tailed deer licenses per year to the injured
20		military wildlife project of North Dakota for distribution. A license issued under this
21		subsection is valid during the period of the deer bow season.
22	<u>2.</u>	One license per year to the national wild turkey federation to hunt wild turkeys in the
23		spring in the manner, places, and times as the governor provides by proclamation. The
24		national wild turkey federation shall hold a raffle for, or may auction to the highest
25		bidder, whether resident or nonresident, the license to hunt wild turkeys. If an
26		individual receives a wild turkey license through the raffle or auction, the individual is
27		not eligible to receive a wild turkey license through the game and fish department that
28		year. No more than ten percent of the gross proceeds of the raffle may be used to
29		promote the raffle. Ten percent of the net proceeds of the raffle may be retained by the
30		local, state, or national wild turkey federation entity conducting the raffle. All remaining
31		net proceeds must be deposited in the national wild turkey federation superfund and

1		used for wild turkey management and related projects in this state. The national wild
2		turkey federation shall submit reports concerning the raffle as the director requires.
3	<u>3.</u>	Up to two licenses per year to the outdoor adventure foundation to hunt a turkey in the
4		spring season. The foundation shall make authorized licenses available to sponsored
5		qualified youths to hunt as the governor provides by proclamation. A qualified youth
6		receiving a license under this section must comply with hunter education requirements
7		and if under the age of eighteen must be accompanied by an adult twenty-one years
8		of age or older. As used in this section, "qualified youth" means an individual who has
9		cancer or a life-threatening illness, is of legal age to hunt a turkey, is under twenty-five
10		years of age, is a resident, and is sponsored by the foundation. The foundation must
11		provide the department supporting documentation demonstrating compliance with this
12		section.
13	<u>4.</u>	One license per year to the midwest chapter of the wild sheep foundation to hunt
14		bighorn sheep in the manner, places, and times as the governor provides by
15		proclamation. The midwest chapter of the wild sheep foundation shall hold a raffle or
16		auction under rules adopted by the director with residents and nonresidents eligible to
17		participate. An individual who has been convicted of illegally taking a moose, elk, or
18		bighorn sheep is not eligible to apply for or receive a license under this subsection.
19		Ten percent of gross raffle proceeds may be retained by the midwest chapter of the
20		wild sheep foundation and ninety percent of gross raffle proceeds must be remitted to
21		the department. All auction proceeds must be remitted to the department. An individual
22		who receives a license through the raffle or auction may not transfer the license.
23	<u>5.</u>	One license per year to the North American wildlife enforcement memorial museum
24		and educational center and the rocky mountain elk foundation to hunt moose in a
25		manner, places, and times as the governor provides by proclamation. The North
26		American wildlife enforcement memorial museum and educational center and the
27		rocky mountain elk foundation shall hold a raffle under rules adopted by the director
28		with residents and nonresidents eligible to participate. The individual who receives the
29		license from the raffle may not transfer the license. No more than ten percent of the
30		gross proceeds of the raffle may be used to promote the raffle. Fifty percent of all net
31		proceeds must be used for elk management or other wildlife and in

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1		conservation-related projects in this state as described under rocky mountain elk		
2		foundation policies and objectives. All remaining The net proceeds distributed to the		
3		North American wildlife enforcement memorial museum and educational center must		
4		be used for construction and maintenance of the North American wildlife enforcement		
5		memorial museum and educational center located at the international peace garden.		
6	I	The North American wildlife enforcement memorial museum and educational center		
7		and the rocky mountain elk foundation shall submit reports concerning the raffle as the		
8		director requires. An individual who has been convicted of illegally taking a moose, elk,		
9	1	or bighorn sheep is not eligible to apply for or receive a license under this subsection.		
10	<u>6.</u>	One license per year to the rocky mountain elk foundation and the North American		
11		wildlife enforcement memorial museum and educational center to hunt elk in a		
12	I	manner, places, and times as the governor provides by proclamation. The rocky		
13		mountain elk foundation and the North American wildlife enforcement memorial		
14		museum and educational center shall hold a raffle under rules adopted by the director		
15	I	with residents and nonresidents eligible to participate. No more than ten percent of the		
16		gross proceeds of the raffle may be used to promote the raffle-and fifty percent of all		
17		net proceeds. The net proceeds distributed to the rocky mountain elk foundation must		
18		be used for elk management or other wildlife and conservation-related projects in		
19	I	North Dakota as described under rocky mountain elk foundation policies and		
20		objectives. All remaining net proceeds must be used for construction and maintenance		
21		of the North American wildlife enforcement memorial museum and educational center		
22		located at the international peace garden. The rocky mountain elk foundation and the		
23		North American wildlife enforcement memorial museum and educational center shall		
24		submit reports concerning the raffle as the director requires. An individual who has		
25		been convicted of illegally taking a moose, elk, or bighorn sheep is not eligible to apply		
26		for or receive a license under this subsection.		
27	<u>7.</u>	One license per year to the mule deer foundation to hunt mule deer in the manner,		
28		places, and times as the governor provides by proclamation. The mule deer		
29		foundation shall hold a raffle or auction under rules adopted by the director with		
30		residents and nonresidents eligible to participate. If an individual receives a mule deer		
31		license through the raffle or auction, the individual is not eligible to receive a mule deer		

1		license through the game and fish department that year. No more than ten percent of
2		the gross proceeds of the raffle may be used to promote the raffle and all net proceeds
3		of the raffle or auction must be used for mule deer management and related projects
4		in North Dakota. The mule deer foundation shall submit reports concerning the raffle
5		or auction as the director requires.
6	<u>8.</u>	One license per year to the North Dakota hunter educators association to hunt
7		antelope in the manner, places, and times as the governor prescribes by proclamation.
8		The North Dakota hunter educators association shall hold a raffle under rules adopted
9		by the director. Only residents are eligible to participate. No more than ten percent of
10		the gross proceeds of the raffle may be used to promote the raffle and all net proceeds
11		of the raffle must be used for sponsoring mentored hunts for youth who may otherwise
12		not have the means to go afield to hunt, establishing a statewide network of shooting
13		locations for youth to become familiar with archery equipment and firearms under the
14		supervision of a certified volunteer hunter education instructor, and purchasing
15		advertising in news media during hunting season concerning firearms safety and
16		hunting ethics and the promotion of safe and responsible hunting. If an individual
17		receives an antelope license through the raffle, the individual is not eligible to apply for
18		an antelope license through the game and fish department that year. The North
19		Dakota hunter educators association shall submit reports concerning the raffle as the
20		director requires.
21	<u>9.</u>	One any elk license, one any moose license, up to seven white-tailed deer licenses,
22		and up to two antelope licenses to the outdoor adventure foundation to hunt the
23		species indicated on the license in the manner, places, and times as the governor
24		prescribes by proclamation. The foundation shall make one license available to each
25		qualified youth to hunt the species of big game indicated on the license as provided in
26		the governor's proclamation. A qualified youth receiving a license under this section
27		must comply with hunter education requirements and if under the age of eighteen
28		must be accompanied by an adult twenty-one years of age or older. As used in this
29		section, "qualified youth" means an individual who has been diagnosed with cancer or
30		a life-threatening illness, is of legal age to hunt the species for which the license is
31		valid, is under twenty-five years of age, is a resident, and is sponsored by the

1		foundation. The foundation must provide the department supporting documentation		
2		demonstrating compliance with this section.		
3	<u>20.</u> 1	20.1-05.1-02. Discretionary special allocation hunting license authorization.		
4	<u>1.</u>	Subject to the restrictions under this section and in addition to the special allocation		
5		licenses authorized under section 20.1-05.1-01, if determined appropriate by the		
6		director based on the sustainability of the species population, the director may issue to		
7		eligible organizations the following annual special allocation hunting licenses:		
8		a. Not more than two elk licenses, but the total issued under this subdivision may		
9		not exceed two percent of the general lottery allocation of elk licenses for the		
10		season.		
11		b. Not more than two moose licenses, but the total issued under this subdivision		
12		may not exceed two percent of the general lottery allocation of moose licenses		
13		for the season.		
14		c. Not more than two antelope licenses, but the total issued under this subdivision		
15		may not exceed two percent of the general lottery allocation of antelope licenses		
16		for the previous season.		
17		d. Not more than ten white-tailed deer licenses.		
18	<u>2.</u>	An eligible organization may apply annually to be considered for issuance of up to two		
19		special allocation hunting licenses under this section. Applications under this		
20		subsection must be filed at the times, in the manner, and containing the information		
21		required by rules adopted by the director. If more applications are filed than the		
22		number of licenses under this section available for that species for a season, the		
23		director shall determine by lottery which organizations will receive the available		
24		licenses.		
25	<u>3.</u>	An eligible organization that obtains a license under this section and conducts a raffle		
26		or auction to determine the recipient of the license must conduct the raffle or auction in		
27		compliance with rules adopted by the director. An eligible organization that obtains a		
28		license under this section shall submit reports concerning a raffle or auction as the		
29		director requires. An individual may apply to receive an elk or moose license through a		
30		raffle or auction under this section as well as through the game and fish department		
31		general lottery. If an individual receives an elk or moose license under this section, the		

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1		indi	vidual is not eligible to receive an elk or moose license through the game and fish	
2		department general lottery that year and may not obtain an elk or moose license under		
3		section 20.1-05.1-01 that year. If an individual receives an elk or moose license under		
4		<u>sec</u>	tion 20.1-05.1-01, the individual is not eligible to receive an elk or moose license	
5		und	er this section that year.	
6	<u>4.</u>	<u>An i</u>	individual who has been convicted of illegally taking a moose, elk, or bighorn sheep	
7		<u>is n</u>	ot eligible to apply for or receive a license under this section.	
8	<u>5.</u>	<u>For</u>	purposes of this section, "eligible organization" means an organization that:	
9		<u>a.</u>	Is exempt from federal income taxation under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal	
10			Revenue Code [26 U.S.C. 501(c)(3)] and provides with its application a copy of	
11			the letter from the internal revenue service to that effect.	
12		<u>b.</u>	Is on file as a nonprofit corporation in good standing in the office of the secretary	
13			of state.	
14		<u>C.</u>	Agrees in its application to contribute at least ten percent of the net proceeds of	
15			any raffle of a license under this section to a conservation-related project to be	
16			conducted in this state and approved by the director.	
17		<u>d</u>	Is not the recipient of a special allocation hunting license under section	
18			<u>20.1-05.1-01.</u>

If all 3 of the licenses to hunt bighorn sheep made available through the state lottery are issued to 4 residents, then a nonresident is not eligible to be issued a license to hunt bighorn sheep 5 through the state lottery. The Minnesota-Wisconsin chapter of the foundation for North American-6 wild sheep shall hold either a raffle or an auction under rules adopted by the director with 7 residents and nonresidents eligible to participate. Ten percent of gross raffle proceeds may be 8 retained by the Minnesota-Wisconsin chapter of the foundation for North American wild sheep 9 and ninety percent of gross raffle proceeds must be remitted to the department. All auction-10 proceeds must be remitted to the department. Individuals who receive a license through the 11 raffle or auction may not transfer the license. Individuals may participate in the state lottery and 12 the raffle or auction; however, individuals under subsection 4 of section 20.1-05.1-01, but an 13 individual may not receive more than one license in any one year. An individual may only 14 receive one license to hunt bighorn sheep through the state lottery in a lifetime. An individual 15 who has been convicted of illegally taking a moose, elk, or bighorn sheep is not eligible to apply 16 for or receive a license under this section. 17 SECTION 6. AMENDMENT. Section 20.1-08-04.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is 18 amended and reenacted as follows: 19 20.1-08-04.2. Governor's proclamation concerning the hunting of moose - Raffle. 20 The governor may by proclamation provide for a season to hunt moose in a manner, 21 number, places, and times as the governor prescribes. Licenses to hunt moose must be issued

by lottery, except as provided under subsection 8 of section 20.1-03-11, with only residents

23 eligible to apply; however, the governor may by proclamation make available to the North-

24 American wildlife enforcement memorial museum and educational center and the rocky-

25 mountain elk foundation one license per year to hunt moose in a manner, places, and times as

26 the governor prescribes. In addition, the governor may by proclamation make available a-

27 license under section 20.1-08-04.13. The North American wildlife enforcement memorial-

28 museum and educational center and the rocky mountain elk foundation shall hold a raffle under-

29 rules adopted by the director with residents and nonresidents eligible to participate. The person-

30 who receives the license from the raffle may not transfer the license. No more than ten percent-

31 of the gross proceeds of the raffle may be used to promote the raffle. Fifty percent of all net

1 proceeds must be used for elk management or other wildlife and in conservation-related

2 projects in this state as described under rocky mountain elk foundation policies and objectives.

3 All remaining net proceeds must be used for construction and maintenance of the North-

4 American wildlife enforcement memorial museum and educational center located at the-

5 international peace garden. The North American wildlife enforcement memorial museum and

6 educational center and the rocky mountain elk foundation shall submit reports concerning the

7 raffle as the director requires. A person may only receive one license to hunt moose issued by

8 lottery in a lifetime. An individual who has been convicted of illegally taking a moose, elk, or

9 bighorn sheep is not eligible to apply for or receive a license under this section.

10 SECTION 7. AMENDMENT. Section 20.1-08-04.6 of the North Dakota Century Code is

11 amended and reenacted as follows:

12 **20.1-08-04.6.** Governor's proclamation concerning the hunting of elk - Rocky-

13 mountain elk foundation raffleSpecial elk depredation management licenses.

14 The governor may by proclamation provide for a season to hunt elk in a manner, number,

15 places, and times as the governor prescribes. Licenses to hunt elk must be issued by lottery,

16 except as provided under subsection 7 of section 20.1-03-11, with only residents eligible to

17 apply; however, the governor may by proclamation make available to the rocky mountain elk-

18 foundation and the North American wildlife enforcement memorial museum and educational-

19 center a license to hunt elk in a manner, places, and times as the governor prescribes. In-

20 addition, the governor may by proclamation make available a license under section-

21 20.1-08-04.13. The rocky mountain elk foundation and the North American wildlife enforcement-

22 memorial museum and educational center shall hold a raffle under rules adopted by the director-

23 with residents and nonresidents eligible to participate. No more than ten percent of the gross-

24 proceeds of the raffle may be used to promote the raffle and fifty percent of all net proceeds-

25 must be used for elk management or other wildlife and conservation-related projects in North-

26 Dakota as described under rocky mountain elk foundation policies and objectives and all

27 remaining net proceeds must be used for construction and maintenance of the North American-

28 wildlife enforcement memorial museum and educational center located at the international-

29 peace garden. The rocky mountain elk foundation and the North American wildlife enforcement-

30 memorial museum and educational center shall submit reports concerning the raffle as the-

31 director requires.

1 An owner of farmed elk who is experiencing elk depredation problems may contact the 2 director. Upon investigation, the director may issue special elk depredation management 3 licenses. The governor by proclamation shall establish a procedure to issue elk depredation 4 management licenses in a timely manner. 5 Except for landowners who receive a license under subsection 7 of section 20.1-03-11 and 6 landowners who receive special elk depredation management licenses issued to landowners 7 under subsection 7 of section 20.1-03-11, and persons who receive a special elk depredation 8 management license issued by lottery under this section, a person may only receive one license 9 to hunt elk issued by lottery in a lifetime. An individual who has been convicted of illegally taking 10 a moose, elk, or bighorn sheep is not eligible to apply for or receive a license under this section. 11 SECTION 8. REPEAL. Sections 20.1-08-04.8, 20.1-08-04.12, and 20.1-08-04.13 of the 12 North Dakota Century Code are repealed. 13 **SECTION 9. EMERGENCY.** This Act is declared to be an emergency measure.
