1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the agriculture

2 commissioner; to provide for a transfer; to amend and reenact sections 4.1-01-02, 4.1-01-17,

3 4.1-83-22, 4.1-83-23, 4.1-83-28, and 54-12-08 of the North Dakota Century Code and section 7

4 of chapter 34 of the 2019 Session Laws, relating to the salary of the agriculture commissioner,

5 the pipeline restoration and reclamation oversight program, insolvency of livestock dealers, the

6 ability of state agencies to employ attorney positions, and the waterbank program; to provide for

7 a report; to provide for a legislative management study; and to declare an emergency.

## 8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

9 SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds
10 as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state
11 treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and
12 other income, to the agriculture commissioner for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the
13 agriculture commissioner, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

APPROPRIATION - TRANSFER - GENERAL FUND TO FEDERAL** 4 ENVIRONMENTAL LAW IMPACT REVIEW FUND - ONE-TIME FUNDING. There is 5 appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise 6 appropriated, the sum of \$5,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, which the 7 office of management and budget shall transfer to the federal environmental law impact review 8 fund for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The agriculture 9 commissioner shall use these funds for defraying costs associated with federal environmental 10 legislation or regulations which detrimentally impact or potentially impact the state's agricultural, 11 energy, or oil production sectors. This funding is considered a one-time funding item. 12 SECTION 5. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA 13 **PROFITS - AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS UTILIZATION COMMISSION - ONE-TIME** 14 FUNDING. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of 15 \$2,700,000 which the Bank of North Dakota shall transfer from the Bank's current earnings and 16 undivided profits to the agriculture commissioner for deposit in the agricultural products 17 utilization commission fund for defraying the expenses of the agricultural products utilization 18 commission for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. This funding is 19 considered a one-time funding item. 20 SECTION 6. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA 21 PROFITS ADDITIONAL INCOME - SOIL HEALTH COVER CROP GRANT PROGRAM -22 **ONE-TIME FUNDING.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum 23 of \$700,000, of which the Bank of North Dakota shall transfer \$300,000 from the Bank's current 24 earnings and undivided profits to the agriculture commissioner for deposit in the agriculture 25 commissioner's operating fund and \$400,000 is from federal or other funds available to the 26 agriculture commissioner for defraying the expenses of the soil health cover crop grant program 27 for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. During the 2021-23 28 biennium, the agriculture commissioner shall submit an application to the North Dakota outdoor 29 heritage advisory board for funding from the outdoor heritage fund for the soil health cover crop 30 grant program, which the North Dakota outdoor heritage advisory board shall consider pursuant

1 to section 54-17.8-03. The agriculture commissioner shall establish guidelines for the use of 2 grant funding provided for this program. This funding is considered a one-time funding item. 3 SECTION 7. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - STATE WATER COMMISSION. The 4 estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$125,000 which the state 5 water commission shall transfer to the agriculture commissioner for the purpose of defraying the 6 expenses of the wildlife services program. 7 SECTION 8. TRANSFER - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND PROTECTION FUND -8 **MINOR USE PESTICIDE FUND.** The agriculture commissioner shall transfer \$325,000 from the 9 environment and rangeland protection fund to the minor use pesticide fund during the biennium 10 beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. 11 SECTION 9. ESTIMATED INCOME - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS 12 FUND - GRASSLANDS GRAZING GRANT PROGRAM - ONE-TIME FUNDING - MATCHING 13 **FUNDS.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$5,000,000 14 from the strategic investment and improvements fund for the purpose of providing grassland 15 grazing grants to an organization representing cooperative grazing associations in the state. To 16 be eligible for a grant under this program, an organization must provide one dollar of matching 17 funds from nonstate sources for every four dollars of grant funding. An organization that 18 receives a grant under this program may distribute the funding to cooperative grazing 19 associations for eligible infrastructure projects, which must be located on national grasslands 20 within the state. Eligible infrastructure projects include water development; fencing; 21 conservation initiatives; compliance with federal permitting requirements, including fees for 22 professional services; and other projects to enhance wildlife habitat, capture carbon, or increase 23 the health of grasslands. Program participants shall develop and implement a grazing land plan 24 in compliance with local soil conservation district guidance and the plan must be approved by 25 the local soil conservation district. The agriculture commissioner shall establish additional 26 guidelines for the program. 27 SECTION 10. ESTIMATED INCOME - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND PROTECTION 28 **FUND.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$6,899,395 29 from the environment and rangeland protection fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses

30 of various agriculture commissioner programs.

SECTION 11. ESTIMATED INCOME - GAME AND FISH FUND. The estimated income line
 item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$619,329 from the game and fish department
 operating fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various agriculture commissioner
 programs.

5 SECTION 12. TRADE OFFICE - MATCHING FUND REQUIREMENT. The North Dakota 6 trade office line item and the general fund appropriation in section 1 of this Act include 7 \$1,600,000 of funding related to the North Dakota trade office. The agriculture commissioner 8 may spend sixty percent of this amount without requiring any matching funds from the trade 9 office. Any additional amounts may be spent only to the extent the North Dakota trade office 10 provides one dollar of matching funds from private or other public sources for each one dollar 11 provided by the agriculture commissioner. Matching funds may include money spent by 12 businesses or organizations to pay salaries to export assistants, providing training to export 13 assistants, or to purchase computer equipment as part of the North Dakota trade office's export 14 assistant program.

15 SECTION 13. AMENDMENT. Section 4.1-01-02 of the North Dakota Century Code isamended and reenacted as follows:

17 4.1-01-02. Salary of agriculture commissioner.

The annual salary of the agriculture commissioner is one hundred sixteentwenty-one
thousand eightfive hundred thirty-sixfifty-three dollars through June 30, 20202022, and one
hundred nineteentwenty-three thousand sevennine hundred fifty-seveneighty-four dollars after
that date.

SECTION 14. AMENDMENT. Section 4.1-01-17 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

4.1-01-17. Pipeline restoration and reclamation oversight <del>pilot</del> program - Generally.

- The commissioner shall establish a pilot program providing technical assistance and
   support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline restoration and followup
   support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline reclamation.
- The commissioner may contract for ombudsmen to be a resource for technical
   assistance and followup on pipeline issues. The ombudsmen may not investigate or
   assist with any pipeline installed before January 1, 2006, or regulated by the public
   service commission under title 49, and may not assist in easement negotiations.

1	3.	The pilot program may provide technical education, support, and outreach on			
2		pipeline-related matters in coordination with other entities.			
3	4.	The commissioner may contract with local individuals, deemed trustworthy by the			
4		surface owners and surface tenants, to be ombudsmen. The commissioner is not			
5		subject to the provisions of chapter 54-44.4 when contracting for the services of			
6		ombudsmen.			
7	<u>5.</u>	The names of surface owners and surface tenants who receive assistance under the			
8		program are closed records as defined in section 44-04-17.1.

 SECTION 18. AMENDMENT. Section 54-12-08 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

## 4 54-12-08. Assistant and special assistant attorneys general - Appointment -

- 5 **Revocation Compensation.**
- 6 1. After consultation with the head of the state department or institution or with the state 7 board, commission, committee, or agency affected, the attorney general may appoint 8 assistant or special assistant attorneys general to represent the state board. 9 commission, committee, or agency. A state officer, head of any state department, 10 whether elected or appointed, or state department, board, commission, committee, or 11 agency may not employ legal counsel, and no person may act as legal counsel in any 12 matter, action, or proceeding in which the state or any state department, board, 13 commission, committee, or agency is interested or is a party, except upon written 14 appointment by the attorney general. Workforce safety and insurance, the department 15 of transportation, the state tax commissioner, the public service commission, the 16 insurance commissioner, the agriculture commissioner, and the securities 17 commissioner may employ attorneys to represent them. These entities shall pay the 18 salaries and expenses of the attorneys they employ within the limits of legislative 19 appropriations. The attorneys that represent these entities must be special assistant 20 attorneys general appointed by the attorney general pursuant to this section. Absent 21 good cause, the attorney general shall appoint as special assistant attorneys general 22 licensed attorneys selected by these entities. The attorney general may revoke the 23 appointment only for good cause or upon the request of the entity. Good cause means 24 an inadequate level of experience, competence, or ethical standards.
- The powers conferred upon special assistant attorneys general are the same as are
   exercised by the regular assistant attorneys general, unless the powers are limited
   specifically by the terms of the appointment. Except as otherwise provided by this
   section, an appointment is revocable at the pleasure of the attorney general. The
   appointment may be made with or without compensation, and when compensation is
   allowed by the attorney general for services performed, the compensation must be
   paid out of the funds appropriated therefor.

- 1 The attorney general may require payment for legal services rendered by any 3. 2 assistant or special assistant attorney general to any state official, board, department, 3 agency, or commission and those entities shall make the required payment to the 4 attorney general. Moneys received by the attorney general in payment for legal 5 services rendered must be deposited into the attorney general's operating fund. 6 General fund moneys may not be utilized for the payment of legal services provided by 7 the attorneys employed by the attorney general, except for those payments required of 8 the department of human services, state department of health, department of 9 environmental quality, and the state hospital.
- 10 4. An assistant or special assistant attorney general appointed to represent the state 11 board of higher education or an institution under the control of the state board of 12 higher education may access and examine any record under the control of the state 13 board of higher education. For purposes of reviewing records under the Family 14 Educational Rights and Privacy Act [20 U.S.C. 1232q; 34 CFR 99] or any other federal 15 privacy law, the assistant or special assistant attorney general is considered a state
- 16 educational official authorized to access student records.

## SECTION 19. ESTIMATED INCOME - PIPELINE RESTORATION AND RECLAMATION.

18 The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$200,000 from the 19 abandoned oil and gas well plugging and site reclamation fund for the purpose of defraying the 20 expenses of the pipeline restoration and reclamation program.

- 21 SECTION 20. AMENDMENT. Section 7 of chapter 34 of the 2019 Session Laws is
- 22 amended and reenacted as follows:
- 23 SECTION 7. WATERBANK PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS. The salaries and 24 wages line item in section 1 of this Act includes up to \$50,000 from the general fund 25 for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the 26 waterbank program.
- 27 SECTION 21. WATERBANK PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS. The salaries and wages
- 28 line item in section 1 of this Act includes up to \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds
- 29 for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program.
- 30 SECTION 22. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - NORTH DAKOTA BEEF
- 31 **COMMISSION.** During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying

- 1 the North Dakota beef commission, including its operations and the selection of commission
- 2 members. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together
- 3 with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative
- 4 assembly.
- 5 SECTION 23. EMERGENCY. Sections 15, 16, and 17 of this Act are declared to be an
- 6 emergency measure.
