1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the various divisions 2 under the supervision of the director of the office of management and budget; to provide an 3 appropriation to the state treasurer; to provide an appropriation to the department of career and 4 technical education, the department of public instruction, the university of North Dakota, 5 Dickinson state university, the highway patrol, the judicial branch, the department of 6 transportation, the department of commerce, and Mayville state university; to provide a 7 contingent appropriation to the Bank of North Dakota; to create and enact a new section to 8 chapter 10-04, a new section to chapter 24-02, and a new subsection to section 54-44-04 of the 9 North Dakota Century Code, relating to notice filing for certain legacy fund investments. 10 cooperative transportation agreements, and state employee salary increases; to amend and 11 reenact subsection 1 of section 10-04-03, section 54-09-05, as amended by section 4 of House 12 Bill No. 1002, as approved by the sixty-seventh legislative assembly, a new chapter to title 54, 13 as created by section 3 of House Bill No. 1452, as approved by the sixty-seventh legislative 14 assembly, subsection 3 of section 54-44-11, sections 54-44.1-18, 54-44.4-07, 54-44.4-08, 15 57-51.1-07.5, subsections 2 and 3 of section 57-51.1-07.7, and subsection 2 of section 16 57-51.1-07.8 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to qualifications of the securities 17 commissioner, the salary of the secretary of state, the clean sustainable energy authority, the 18 balance of the state personnel training and development operating fund, publishing political 19 subdivision budgets, environmentally preferable products, the state share of oil and gas tax 20 revenue allocations, the municipal infrastructure fund, and the county and township 21 infrastructure fund; to repeal section 54-06-25 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the 22 state employee compensation commission; to provide for a transfer; to provide for a claims 23 payment; to provide compensation guidelines; to provide an exemption; to provide a statement 24 of legislative intent; to provide for a legislative management study; to provide a report; and to 25 declare an emergency.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the office of management and budget for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the office of management and budget, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023, as follows:

SECTION 4. APPROPRIATION - STATE DISASTER RELIEF FUND - TAX RELIEF FUND STATE TREASURER - DISTRIBUTIONS TO NON-OIL-PRODUCING COUNTIES.

24 1. a. Due to extraordinary flooding in 2020 in parts of the state and due to the 25 excessive cost of road maintenance, there is appropriated out of any moneys in 26 the state disaster relief fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the 27 sum of \$8,200,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, and out of any 28 moneys in the tax relief fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the 29 sum of \$1,800,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the state 30 treasurer for the purpose of providing distributions to non-oil-producing counties 31 for the benefit of the organized and unorganized townships within each

1			non-oil-producing county, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending
2			June 30, 2023.
3		b.	In August 2021, the state treasurer shall distribute \$10,000,000, or so much of
4			the sum as may be necessary, to non-oil-producing counties for the benefit of the
5			organized and unorganized townships within each non-oil-producing county. The
6			distribution to each non-oil-producing county must provide for an equal allocation
7			to each organized and unorganized township within the county.
8		C.	The amount allocated to organized townships under this subsection must be paid
9			by the county treasurer to each organized township. The amount allocated to
10			unorganized townships under this subsection must be credited by the county
11			treasurer to a special fund for unorganized township roads.
12		d.	The distributions under this subsection must be used for the maintenance and
13			improvement of township paved and unpaved roads and bridges. A township is
14			not eligible for an allocation of funds under this subsection if the township does
15			not maintain any township roads.
16		e.	For the purposes of this section, a "non-oil-producing county" means a county
17			that has received no allocation of funding or a total allocation of funding under
18			subsection 2 of section 57-51-15 of less than \$5,000,000 for the period beginning
19			September 1, 2019, and ending August 31, 2020.
20	2.	a.	There is appropriated out of any moneys in the tax relief fund in the state
21			treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$10,000,000, or so much of the
22			sum as may be necessary, to the state treasurer for the purpose of providing
23			distributions to non-oil-producing counties for the benefit of the organized and
24			unorganized townships within each non-oil-producing county, for the biennium
25			beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.
26		b.	In August 2021, the state treasurer shall distribute \$10,000,000, or so much of
27			the sum as may be necessary, to non-oil-producing counties for the benefit of the
28			organized and unorganized townships within each non-oil-producing county. The
29			distribution to each non-oil-producing county must provide for an allocation to
30			each organized and unorganized township that is proportional to the number of
31			township road miles in each organized and unorganized township relative to the

3	4.	There is appropriated from federal funds derived from the federal coronavirus capital
4		projects fund, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$4,000,000, or so much of the
5		sum as may be necessary, to Dickinson state university for the purpose of a Pulver
6		hall project, a meat processing laboratory remodel, and other projects for the period
7		beginning with the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 2023.
8	5.	There is appropriated from federal funds derived from the federal coronavirus capital
9		projects fund, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$3,000,000, or so much of the
10		sum as may be necessary, to the highway patrol for the purpose of a law enforcement
11		training center remodel project for the period beginning with the effective date of this
12		Act, and ending June 30, 2023.
13	6.	There is appropriated from federal funds derived from the federal coronavirus capital
14		projects fund, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$500,000, or so much of the sum
15		as may be necessary, to the office of management and budget for the purpose of
16		providing a grant for the construction of a new medical center located in the county
17		seat of Griggs County for the period beginning with the effective date of this Act, and
18		ending June 30, 2023.
19	7.	There is appropriated from federal funds derived from the federal coronavirus capital
20		projects fund, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$157,600, or so much of the sum
21		as may be necessary, to the judicial branch for the purpose of purchasing information
22		technology equipment for the period beginning with the effective date of this Act, and
23		ending June 30, 2023.

This funding is 8 considered a one-time funding item. 9 SECTION 11. APPROPRIATION - JUDICIAL BRANCH - VETERANS' COURT. There is 10 appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise 11 appropriated, the sum of \$145,247, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the judicial 12 branch for the purpose of establishing a veterans' treatment court in the northeast central

13 judicial district, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 12. APPROPRIATION - JUDICIAL BRANCH - YOUTH CULTURAL
 ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAMS. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in
 the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$90,000, or so much of the sum as
 may be necessary, to the judicial branch for youth cultural achievement programs, for the
 biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.
 SECTION 13. 2019-21 BIENNIUM APPROPRIATION - TRANSFER - GENERAL FUND TO

HIGHWAY FUND - 2021-23 BIENNIUM APPROPRIATION - HIGHWAY FUND AND FEDERAL FUNDS - REPORT.

- There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not
 otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$100,000,000, which the office of management
 and budget shall transfer to the highway fund during the period beginning with the
 effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 2021. The funds transferred to the
 highway fund must be maintained and reported separately from other funds in the
 highway fund.
- There is appropriated out of any moneys in the highway fund, not otherwise
 appropriated, the sum of \$100,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary,
 to the department of transportation for the purpose of matching federal discretionary
 funds received in excess of the regular federal funding amounts included in the

1		department's 2021-23 biennium budget, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and
2		ending June 30, 2023. Of this amount, the department shall use at least \$10,000,000
3		for matching federal funds for township road and bridge projects.
4	3.	There is appropriated from federal funds, the sum of \$100,000,000, or so much of the
5		sum as may be necessary, to the department of transportation for the purpose of
6		defraying the expenses of road and bridge construction projects for the biennium
7		beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.
8	4.	On June 30, 2023, the office of management and budget shall transfer any
9		unexpended and unobligated funds transferred to the highway fund under
10		subsection 1 to the general fund.
11	5.	During the 2021-22 interim, the department of transportation shall provide quarterly
12		reports to the budget section regarding the use of funds transferred from the general
13		fund to the highway fund.
14	SEC	CTION 14. LEGACY FUND EARNINGS ESTIMATE - 2019-21 BIENNIUM. For

23	in sectio	n 8 of chapter 26 of the 2019 Session Laws related to the Theodore Roosevelt
24	presider	ntial library, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The
25	funding	provided in this section is available only if the actual July 1, 2021, general fund balance
26	exceeds	the legislative estimate made at the close of the 2021 legislative session by at least

28	conside	red a one-time funding item.
29	SEC	CTION 16. TRANSFER - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND TO
30	GENER	AL FUND. The office of management and budget shall transfer the sum of

- 1 \$410,000,000 from the strategic investment and improvements fund to the general fund during
- 2 the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

3 SECTION 17. TRANSFER - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND TO 4 **CULTURAL ENDOWMENT FUND - INTENT.** The office of management and budget shall 5 transfer the sum of \$1,000,000 from the strategic investment and improvements fund to the 6 cultural endowment fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 7 2023. It is the intent of the sixty-seventh legislative assembly that the council on the arts expend 8 up to \$50,000 annually from the cultural endowment fund pursuant to the appropriation authority 9 provided in section 2 of Senate Bill No. 2010 during the 2021-23 biennium for the maintenance 10 of the public arts projects constructed as part of the North Dakota creative placemaking 11 program. It is further the intent of the legislative assembly that the council on the arts continue 12 to expend \$50,000 annually from the cultural endowment fund for the maintenance of the public 13 arts projects constructed as part of the North Dakota creative placemaking program until the 14 moneys derived from the strategic investment and improvements fund transfer authorized under 15 this section and deposited in the fund have been fully expended. 16 SECTION 18. TRANSFER - TAX RELIEF FUND TO HUMAN SERVICE FINANCE FUND.

The office of management and budget shall transfer the sum of \$187,223,092 from the tax relief
fund to the human service finance fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending
June 30, 2023.

20 SECTION 19. TRANSFER - STATE STUDENT INTERNSHIP PROGRAM FUNDS TO

STATE AGENCIES. The office of management and budget shall transfer funds from the state
student internship program line item appropriated in section 1 of this Act to eligible state
agencies for state student internships during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending
June 30, 2023.

25 SECTION 20. ESTIMATED INCOME - ONE-TIME FUNDING - CAPITOL BUILDING

FUND. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes \$2,168,800 of one-time funding from the capitol building fund. Of the \$2,168,800, \$350,000 in the operating expenses line item is for a facility consolidation study, \$300,000 in the operating expenses line item is for special assessments associated with the capitol grounds, \$500,000 in the capital assets line item is for extraordinary repairs, \$518,800 in the capital assets line item is for a building

1 automation project, and \$500,000 in the capital assets line item is for interior and exterior

2 signage.

3 SECTION 21. ESTIMATED INCOME - ONE-TIME FUNDING - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT 4 **AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes 5 \$3,251,304 from the strategic investment and improvements fund. Of the \$3,251,304, 6 \$2,021,204 in the capital assets line item is for procurement software, and \$1,230,100 in the 7 capital assets line item is for budget software. 8 SECTION 22. GRANTS AND SPECIAL ITEMS. Section 1 of this Act includes appropriation 9 authority which may be used only for the following grants and special items: 10 Unemployment insurance \$2,000,000 11 Capitol grounds planning commission \$25,000 12 Statewide memberships and related expenses \$642,089 13 SECTION 23. RISK MANAGEMENT FUND - CLAIMS PAYMENT. Pursuant to the 14 continuing appropriation authority under section 32-12.2-07, the director of the office of 15 management and budget may make payments from the risk management fund during the 16 biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023, for reasonable and necessary 17 costs and attorney's fees incurred by a state employee as a result of a criminal investigation or 18 prosecution occurring after December 31, 2018, under circumstances in which there was an 19 absence of probable cause, as identified in a prosecutorial or judicial determination or as 20 determined by the director of the office of management and budget in the absence of a 21 prosecutorial or judicial determination, and in which the offense involves the discharge of a 22 public duty. The director of the office of management and budget shall consult with the attorney 23 general when reviewing claims under this section and shall obtain written approval from the 24 attorney general for any claim exceeding ten thousand dollars. 25 SECTION 24. STATE EMPLOYEE COMPENSATION ADJUSTMENTS - GUIDELINES. 26 1. The 2021-23 biennium compensation adjustments for permanent state employees are 27 to average 1.5 percent with a minimum of \$100 per month per eligible employee for 28 the first fiscal year of the biennium and are to average 2 percent per eligible employee 29 for the second year of the biennium. The increases for the first year of the biennium 30 are to be given beginning with the month of July 2021, to be paid in August 2021, and 31 for the second year of the biennium are to be given beginning with the month of July

- 2022, to be paid in August 2022. Except for minimum amounts, increases for eligible
 state employees are to be based on documented performance and are not to be the
 same percentage increase for each employee.
