## FIRST ENGROSSMENT with House Amendments ENGROSSED SENATE BILL NO. 2021

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**Appropriations Committee** 

- 1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the information
- 2 technology department; to amend and reenact section 54-59-07 of the North Dakota Century
- 3 Code, relating to the state information technology advisory committee; to provide a transfer; to
- 4 provide for a report; to provide an exemption; to provide for a statement of legislative intent; to
- 5 provide for a legislative management study; and to declare an emergency.

## 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

**SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION.** The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the information technology department for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the information technology department, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

20	SECTION 3. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - HEALTH INFORMATION				
21	TECHNOLOGY PLANNING LOAN FUND TO ELECTRONIC HEALTH INFORMATION				
22	<b>EXCHANGE FUND - LEGISLATIVE INTENT - ONE-TIME FUNDING.</b> Notwithstanding section				
23	6-09-43, the estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$6,000,000,				
24	or so much of the sum as may be necessary, which the Bank of North Dakota shall transfer, as				
25	requested by the chief information officer, from the health information technology planning loan			ogy planning loan	
26	fund to the electronic health information exchange fund for the purpose of defraying the			fraying the	
27	expenses of the health information technology office and the health information network during			on network during	
28	the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. It is the intent of the				
29	sixty-seventh legislative assembly that funding be transferred only to the extent federal funding				
30	is not available to defray the expenses of the health information technology office and the health				

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- 1 information network during the 2021-23 biennium. This funding is considered a one-time funding 2 item.
- SECTION 4. EXEMPTION LINE ITEM TRANSFERS. Notwithstanding section 54-16-04,
  the director of the office of management and budget shall make transfers of funds between line
  items in section 1 of this Act for the information technology department as may be requested by
  the chief information officer as determined necessary for the development and implementation
  of information technology projects. The department shall notify the legislative council of any
  transfers made pursuant to this section.
  - **SECTION 5. ESTIMATED INCOME FEDERAL CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$6,500,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the federal coronavirus relief fund for cybersecurity operating expenses.
  - **SECTION 6. AMENDMENT.** Section 54-59-07 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
    - 54-59-07. State information technology advisory committee.

The state information technology advisory committee consists of the chief information officer; the commissioner of higher education or the commissioner's designee; the attorney general or the attorney general's designee; the secretary of state or the secretary of state's designee; the tax commissioner or the commissioner's designee; the chief justice of the supreme court or the chief justice's designee; two members of the legislative assembly appointed by the legislative management, of which one member must be the chairman of the information technology committee; a minimum of eight members representing state agencies, appointed by the governor; and two members with technology management expertise representing private industry, appointed by the governor. The appointees of the governor serve at the pleasure of the governor. The governor shall designate the chairmanchief information officer and chairman of the information technology committee shall serve as co-chairmen of the state information technology advisory committee. Additional members may be asked to participate at the request of the chairman chairmen. The department shall provide staff services to the committee. The members of the committee representing private industry are entitled to be compensated for time spent in attendance at meetings of the committee and for other travel as approved by the chairmanchairmen of the committee at the rate of sixty-two dollars and fifty

- 1 cents per day and are entitled to reimbursement for actual and necessary expenses incurred in
- 2 the same manner as other state officials. The compensation and expenses are to be paid from
- 3 appropriations for the department. The committee shall advise the department regarding
- 4 statewide information technology planning and budgeting, services of the information
- 5 technology department, and statewide information technology initiatives and policy and shall
- 6 review reports on major information technology projects as required by this chapter and
- 7 policies, standards, and guidelines developed by the department. The chief information officer
- 8 shall submit recommendations of the committee regarding information technology issues to the
- 9 information technology committee for its consideration.
- 10 SECTION 7. EXEMPTION STATEWIDE INTEROPERABLE RADIO NETWORK. The
- 11 \$20,000,000 appropriated from the strategic investment and improvements fund for the
- 12 statewide interoperable radio network in section 8 of chapter 293 of the 2019 Session Laws is
- 13 not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the statewide interoperable radio network
- project during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.
- 15 **SECTION 8. LEGISLATIVE INTENT PHONE EQUIPMENT.** It is the intent of the
- 16 sixty-seventh legislative assembly that the information technology department:
- 17 1. Supply at least one physical phone in each state agency;
- 18 2. Give state agencies the option of having a physical phone for each employee in the
- 19 agency; and
- 3. Allow the head of each agency to determine the number of phones provided to the
- 21 agency.

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- SECTION 9. LEGISLATIVE INTENT LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY -
- 23 **INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY DIRECTION.** It is the intent of the sixty-seventh legislative
- 24 assembly that the information technology department provide direction to executive branch
- 25 agencies regarding information technology strategic planning and operations during the
- biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. During the 2021-22 interim, the
- 27 legislative management shall consider studying the feasibility and desirability of the legislative
- 28 branch and judicial branch receiving strategic planning and operational information technology
- 29 direction from the information technology department beginning in the 2023-25 biennium. The
- 30 legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any
- 31 legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.

1	SECTION 10. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - STATE GOVERNMENT
2	INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY BUDGETING AND APPROPRIATION PROCESS. During the
3	2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the state government
4	information technology budgeting and appropriations process. The study must include a review
5	of the current process and the feasibility and desirability of providing a general fund
6	appropriation to the information technology department rather than providing general fund
7	appropriations to state agencies to pay the information technology department for information
8	technology services. The study must include consideration of any cost or cost-savings that may
9	result and any transparency benefits of the potential budgeting and appropriation changes. The
10	legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any
11	legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.
12	SECTION 11. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY
13	UNIFICATION. During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying
14	the effectiveness, efficiency, cost, and any cost-savings of the 2019-21 biennium and 2021-23
15	biennium information technology unification initiatives and the feasibility and desirability of
16	continuing these initiatives. The study must include a review of changes in fees, services,
17	operations, processes, and systems. The legislative management shall report its findings and
18	recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to
19	the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.
20	SECTION 12. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - CYBERSECURITY. During the
21	2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying costs incurred by the
22	information technology department to deliver core technology services and cybersecurity
23	services to state agencies and political subdivisions. The study must consider the feasibility and
24	desirability of political subdivisions paying their share of the cost of these services. The
25	legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any
26	legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.
27	SECTION 13. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - IMPACT OF LARGE
28	TECHNOLOGY COMPANIES. During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall
29	consider studying competitive fairness, economic development implications, and other
30	economic and societal impacts of large technology companies conducting business in North
31	Dakota. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together

- 1 with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative
- 2 assembly.
- 3 SECTION 14. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY VIRTUAL CURRENCY BUSINESS
- 4 **ACTIVITY.** During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the
- 5 feasibility and desirability of regulating special purpose depository institutions and regulating
- 6 other entities engaged in virtual currency business activities. The legislative management shall
- 7 report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the
- 8 recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.
- 9 **SECTION 15. EMERGENCY.** House Bill No. 1417, as approved by the sixty-seventh
- 10 legislative assembly, is declared to be an emergency measure.
