REMARKS OF REPRESENTATIVE SCHNEIDER

MR. SPEAKER: Recognition of International Women's Day

March 8, 2023

Representative Mary Schneider

Happy International Women's Day to my wonderful women colleagues of both parties, and to our male allies who support and encourage us and their wives, mothers, daughters, and granddaughters.

Worldwide, groups and individuals unify on March 8 to celebrate and support women's advancement, and pause to assess and address areas of continuing concern. The splashes of purple you see in the chamber today are one of the Women's Day colors, symbolizing justice, dignity, and loyalty to a project or purpose. The day is a national holiday in some countries, and has been observed globally since 1911, a time of turbulence in the industrialized world and a period where women were fighting for the right to vote.

The world has made great strides since then in both women's and society's thoughts about women's emancipation, equality, and embracing equity. There are more women in the workplace, in the highest levels of leadership, and acting as role models in every aspect of life.

Although much progress has been made, much more needs to be done, there have been recent setbacks from the global pandemic, the Taliban, international conflict, and war.

No country has yet attained gender equality, although the overall Global Gender Gap Index which considers economics, education, healthcare and other factors improved a bit from 67.9 to 68.1%, in the past year, but it will still may take over 100 years to close the gap. North America is the best region, with a score of 76.9% this year, reducing the time to close the gap from 62 to 59 years.

In the economics area it's an unfortunate fact that women are still not paid equally when compared to their male counterparts throughout the world. The U.S. has improved to 82%, but North Dakota census and other study numbers still hover around 75%, meaning women here earn about 75 cents to every dollar men make, or an average of \$13,950 less annually than men, among the 10 worst states. Over 14% of North Dakota women, or nearly one in nine, live in poverty.

That pay gap impacts significantly women's wealth accumulation over a lifetime, as does the amount of unpaid care time gap between men and women, with women globally spending about three times as many hours on unpaid domestic and family care work as men.

And violence against women and girls remains a persistent and lethal problem:

- Around one-third of women worldwide have experienced physical and/or sexual violence by an intimate partner.

- Eighteen percent have experienced such violence in the past 12 months.

- An estimated 137 women globally are killed by a family member or intimate partner every day.

- Only 153 countries have domestic violence laws.

Women and girls in some parts of the world are subjected to other types of violence like genital mutilation, physical punishment, and/or death for violations of cultural, religious, and family norms, dress codes, appearances in public, unaccompanied movements, and exercise of what we consider constitutional and human rights.

We also continue to have considerable work to do in equal and appropriate access to healthcare for women in our country and the world, global and domestic post-primary education, STEM and professional occupations, leadership in business, and other areas of inequality. In politics, women are only 24% of our legislature and only 4 of 20 executive cabinet members are women. And we earlier heard this session about women in House Committee Leadership. So we have a way to go, but we're mostly moving in the right direction, albeit slowly.

One of the factors recognized as a major positive trend in accelerating women's equality is men as public advocates and visible, vocal champions of change. So we're in this together, and can renew our commitment on this special day to do whatever we can, whenever we can, wherever we can, to embrace equity, and to promote equality, opportunity, access, and equal rights for women and girls.
